

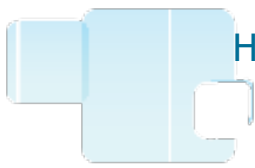

HEPATITIS C TREATMENT UPDATES

Treatment of Hepatitis C has improved dramatically since the virus was discovered in 1989. In the last seven years, 12 new oral direct acting antiviral agents were approved by FDA, and these agents have improved cure rates from 40-50% to over 90-98% with fewer side effects and shorter durations of therapy. This session will explore how pharmacists can play a vital role in the treatment of Hepatitis C by choosing appropriate therapy, duration of therapy, providing education, encouraging adherence, and monitoring for side effects.

DEVELOPMENT OF A MEDICATION THERAPY/CHRONIC DISEASE MANAGEMENT CLINIC IN A SMALL COMMUNITY HOSPITAL TO OPTIMIZE CLINICAL OUTCOMES AND REDUCE HOSPITAL READMISSION RATES

Rules and guidelines to address the opioid epidemic and reduce inappropriate and excessive prescribing of opioid analgesics have begun to impact numbers of prescriptions, quantities, and amount per dose of these medications. However, too frequently, patients are abruptly cut off from receiving additional opioid prescriptions. When opioids are no longer appropriate, rational discontinuation techniques are necessary along with alternative methods of controlling pain to prevent physical and psychological opioid withdrawal and the potential for driving patients toward illicit methods for managing their suffering.
